2013 ANNUAL DIVISION 10 DIORAMA PROGRAM

As a result of the success of previous diorama programs and interest from members in building dioramas, we will have our third annual program for 2013. This will be the last year I'll judge the dioramas so that younger members can take over in 2014.

The minimum size will remain the same at 12"x18" with a maximum of 16"x24" for those interested in building a diorama in larger scales. The judging will take place at the March 3, 2013 meeting, which allows plenty of time to plan and build your entry. Having your diorama judged the best is always fun but everyone who participates is a *winner* because you will develop skills that you can use in your future modeling activities.

Last years judging form will be used to give you more space to describe how you built your entry and with more points available for Detail in this year's program.

30 points can be earned in Construction.

30 points can be earned in Detail.

20 points can be earned in Finish and Lettering.

20 points can be earned in Scratch building.

A foam base is recommended. See the "Excerpts" on page 3. It will permit you to demonstrate the use of water on your entry. A river with a bridge, a pond, ditch, culvert or waterfall will add interest to the scene. Elevation, use of rocks, trees and people will also be judged for their realism. You can build as many structures as you need to make your scene realistic and consider adding a detailed interior for earning detail points.

Good luck and great modeling to all who participate in this year's program. It will be fun!

The diorama judging form for you to bring with you entry will be included in the next *Lantern*.

- Rivets: And then?
- Larry: I had to use the rest room, so I tucked an issue of N Scale under my arm and went to the porcelain library. Meanwhile some neighbor kids came over and Bonnie sent them down. And meanwhile, I 'd fallen asleep on the throne. So the kids had a ball runnin' my new N scale cab forward through the powdered snow.
- Rivets: Why does it always happen to you?
- Larry: That ain't the half of it. I had a bare spot on my layout where I had used the recipe for snow from "Model Railroad Scenery." It was pretty gooey and sticky. The kids had run my new set of Kato F3s through the sticky stuff...where they are now glued permanently in place.
- Rivets: Wow!
- Larry: After a while, since they couldn't find me, they left. A couple hours later I woke up, by legs were numb. I staggered back to the train room to find every thing they had left.
- Rivets: I'll bet you were ready to strangle those kids.
- Larry: Well, I could either enjoy the white Christmas or I could cry. So, I turned up the volume on "White Christmas", opened up a collector's bottle of Makers Mark, and kicked back to contemplate how I was going to clean up all that mess.
- Rivets: Did you call their parents?
- Larry: What good would that do? The kids were all over twenty one. And by the way, the Makers Mark was the terrific part.

Excerpts from Bob Lawson's December 2012 Foam Clinic

- A. Types of foam products and sources: Density: 2#, 1.5#, and 1#. Dow 2# density comes in 4'x8'x2" thickness. This gives good structural support. The most workable for modeling is the 1.5# density, sold in 2'x4' packs, white in color. It is available at most drywall suppliers. The 1# density in 1" thickness should be avoided.
- B. Characteristics and ease in working: Either the 1.5# or 2# can be used over basic bench work as a base. On top, use foam or Homasote roadbed for the track. 2# is the toughest for forming shapes. 1.5# works easier for scenery.
- C. Tools for shaping and cutting the foam: Hot knife, serrated knives, electric sanders with #60 paper, and hand rasps.
- D. Products for assembling: Foam Adhesive. The best is "Acrylic Adhesive Clear Caulk." Skewers to hold the foam. Drywall screws. "Non drip" caulking gun. Layer the foam. For higher backgrounds, layer with hollow middles or set the foam vertically.
- E. Assembly of foam sheets: Cut the sheets to the required size. Apply the adhesive caulking with complete coverage, holding together with skewers. With a black marker, draw the cuts to be made. Use a hot knife or serrated knives for shaping. Apply scenery materials to the shaped foam.
- F. Scenic applications: Join areas with plaster cloth and brushed on molding plaster. Cover all the foam surface with craft paint. Use Hobby Lobby "chipboard" for roads. Add trees, poles, buildings, track and ground cover. Rocks at www.cripplebush.net.
