I want to start a new section of my Report each month dictated to tips that could help our new modelers and maybe some that our old pros will pick up something they can use. This month I want to talk about paint, old and new. Paint has become an expensive necessity of our hobby. Nothing worse than opening an old jar of paint to find it has dried up. Before you throw it out consider rejuvenating it. To do this add thinner equal to about a quarter of the amount of the dried paint. Replace the lid tightly and allow it to set a few days. You should be able to take a stir of some type and begin to stir the mixture. It may take a little work but you should be left with some usable paint. You can even add a little more thinner and let it set another day. For this to work you need about a quarter of a bottle of paint or more. Another tip I have is for a new bottle of paint. We have all taken the new bottle and shaken it but it doesn't completely mix. You can purchase a battery operated mixer or you can add BB's to the paint and then shake it. Acts much like a spray can when you shake the bottle. Hope this helps with any old or new paint, to stretch your paint.

Our upcoming program for the February meeting will be "RTV Molds and Resin Casting" by Bob Belt. The Bring and Bragg will be an "Open Top Hopper or a Log Car". I don't know about you but I'm ready to get out of the house and fellowship with our members. Looking forward to seeing you at the meeting on the 7th.



John Gorman (age 69) most recently started playing with HO scale trains about 14 years ago after my son was grown and out on his own. Fortunately I had a large basement and unfortunately no one to guide me. So I built a 10' by 6' plywood table on sawhorses and nailed down two circles of track (w/no cork). With a twin MRC transformer I was having a great time running two trains around the circles of track.

Fast forward a few years and I had a dream railroad in mind, an around the wall with a peninsula or two. It would have over 400 feet of track with lots of hills, two large yards and much more. The track would be a single line main with lots of long passing tracks and sidings. To get the advice on how to build the railroad I joined the Division 10 club. I decided that if I wanted the best possible discount to buy what I needed I would have to find a way to buy wholesale. And, Bluegrass Model Railway Supply happened to be for sale at the time, so I bought it.

I moved the entire inventory, except what I wanted for my railroad, into a storage locker and started buying stuff for my layout. At the time I felt like I should share the wealth so and I offered to sell to the guys whatever they needed at cost. This soon became more work than I wanted so I changed the deal to 30% off of list whenever possible. Pretty soon I started stocking up on what I thought the guys would want in the way of track, cork, building supplies, tools and anything else I thought they might need as they built their railroads. It wasn't long before I became a full-fledged dealer.

At this time I moved all the old BGMS inventory back into the basement and I started to stock locomotives and rolling stock to go along with the supplies, and before you know it I had filled up that space I was going to use for my railroad. I still dream about that layout and the day may come when I may build it, but not now.

I enjoy being a member of the Bluegrass Railroad Club and Division 10. That comradery along with all the guys I meet and enjoy working with while being a model train dealer is just what I am looking for at this time in my life. I have developed some great friendships as well as a lot of acquaintances that I have enjoyed. There is a lot more to model trains than having a layout, or even a dealership. The very best part of the hobby is the people.
