My tip of the month is around weathering powders on your layout. I use many different products to weather buildings, scenery and train stock. My favorite is Doc O'Brien's weathering powders. I don't limit myself to just powder that you can purchase. I also use powders that I make from pastel chalks. These are especially good to use on buildings. The chalk powder will come off your hands but sticks really well to buildings.

First, you need a good base to apply any powder. If you have train stock for example, spray the entire item with a dull coat to take the glossy finish off. Next start working with the powder making sure you apply in the direction from top to bottom. Keeping with that downward flow will give the appearance of the natural weather on a boxcar, etc. Depending on the amount of powders used, spray a very light coat of dull coat on the model. With the right amount you will have a model that you can be proud off.

Keep modeling fun




In Recognition...



A Life Long Hobby, member profile by Tom Krill

A number of us have several lifelong hobbies that never seem to go away. While I was without trains for many years the fascination never went away. It really began with our move from Pittsburgh, Pa. to Tempe, Ariz. in 1947 which meant a number of trips back and forth to Pittsburgh by train. My favorite was Santa Fe El Capitan, although the Southern Pacific out of Chicago was more convenient stopping in Phoenix. Of course the 1949 Lionel Scout set for Christmas just propelled my interest even more. Over the years I begged for yet another car at Christmas time.

Move forward to our son Ken while we were living in Hong Kong. I couldn't wait to make a small train layout for him for his 1985 Christmas. Alas he never took an interest in trains and I still have the Lima Orient Express set purchased at that time. Returning to the US in 1986, I always had my Lionel set or the Orient Express under the Christmas tree. Still no interest from our son.

I had the good fortune to be the company's Regional Manager for Mexico for a couple of years, a country that always interested me. As it happened a great uncle went there in the late 1800's and survived the revolution – as a Catholic priest no less- dying there in 1942. While in Mexico over weekends I took the opportunity to visit Cordoba, Veracruz to learn about his life there. He is revered for his civic accomplishments yet today (library, fire department and others) and there is a bronze bust of him in the central plaza. Part of my investigation turned up photos of a little narrow gauge railroad which ran about 50 miles out from Cordoba over very difficult terrain known as the Huatusquito. One Christmas eve I went to get a transformer to run our Orient Express and there in the shop was a Bachman On30 set on sale. The Mogul engine in the box looked just like the one on the Cordoba line. Hooked again, I bought the set and determined to research the history of and model the Huatusquito. Since then the city has managed to bring back the one surviving 1902 Mogul from Mexico City and give it a cosmetic restoration. I provided the details. My goal is to provide the history of the line and my models (1902 as delivered and 1952 when the line went out of business) for a museum which will attract tourism to the city and help the economy.

The photo near the bottom of page 2 is of the Tomatlan bridge, reported to be the highest railroad bridge in North America when completed in 1903.
