In this day and age, it isn't often you can ride a train pulled by a steam engine much less be the engineer of a coal fired engine vourself. LIVE STEAM IS NEXT. Saturday, May 13th is going to be a day many Div. 10 members will remember for a long time. After a clinic on firing and running the engine, our "Yardmaster", Joe Holbrook, has a plan that should let every member of Div. 10 run a steam engine and a diesel for at least one trip around the track. A map to J.O. Johnson's farm with safety rules that absolutely MUST be followed are included in the issue. Safety First, Fun will Follow!

Although I have run a live steam locomotive several times, I am still enough of a novice that each experience is a new one for me. Keep the steam pressure up, watch the water level in the boiler, sound the whistle, check the passengers in the cars behind you and then ease the throttle to pull out of the station. Make sure

KEEP HANDS AND FEET IN CARS




Website Update
