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MEMBER PROFILES Adam Harmon



Adam lives in Lawrenceburg, with his wife, Tiffany, and is currently a seminary student at Lexington Theological Seminary. He originally became interested in model railroading as a young boy when he and his father put together a basic 5 foot square HO layout.

He is a beginning modeler, currently working on a 12 x 6 foot N-scale layout, which is operational, but as yet unscenicked. He just recently installed the turnouts and wiring, including a rather tortuous reverse loop.

The layout locale is Colorado at the turn of the century (last one, not this one, around 1870 to 1910.) This made for a challenging job to lay the track amidst all the mountains, especially in standard gauge!

The first motive power acquisition is the MDC (Roundhouse) N-Scale 2-8-0, with the motor in the tender, turning the drivers through a shaft from the tender to the engine.

He also has an N-Trak module under construction.

Adam has been a willing helper on several Division 10 projects, and a most welcome addition to the organization. He is a 'regular' at the Tuesday night gatherings, and has attended several of the operations sessions.
