You would think a manufacturer knows how to convert their own locomotives to DCC. Their customer service advice was to follow the manufacturers instructions of the decoder. Rivets: So, I am sure you go some good information there!

Larry: Yeah, right again. Those instructions were like using a map globe of the world to find my way across town.

Rivets: That's too bad. So what did you do?

Larry: I called Train World.

They sell the stuff and they should know how to use it. Right?

Rivets: Right!

Larry: Wrong! I said, do you have to run your locomotives only with that particular manufacturers power source? And he said, "They all tell you that. Use what you want. I have a nice one here for a good price. And when I asked if he had any advice on installing decoders in G scale locomotives he told me that he had been working with them for fifteen years, but couldn't tell me squat. suggested I call Aristocraft again.

Rivets: Okay, now you're getting somewhere.

Larry: Rivets, I was there! Anyway, I called Aristocraft again and asked if they knew how to install a decoder. They finally said they didn't but I should call MRC and ask for Frank

Rivets: Did ya?

Larry: Yeah, no sweat. Had a nice conversation with Frank. He said their Command 2000 would work with the Aristocraft locomotives, but I would have to buy the MRC power booster to bring the amperage up enough to run the things. That would give me about ten amps to run two trains. He

was really knowledgeable.

Rivets: So, now ya ARE getting somewhere!

Larry: NO! When I asked how to isolate the motor in an Aristo-craft steam engine, he told me to call Michael and ask him because he knows how to get the things apart.

Rivets: Who is Michael.

Larry: He is the guy I talked to in the first place. He works at Aristocraft.

Rivets: So, let me get this straight. None of the manufacturers, including the manufacturer of the DCC system, Command 2000 can tell you how to isolate the motor and install the decoder.

Larry: I'm going back to N scale, at least there when things go wrong, I can throw the engine really far!

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MEMBER PROFILES Skip Keyser



Skip is a native of Chicago who got interested in model railroading when he received his first Lionel train set for Christmas when he was 7 or 8 years old... With his two brothers, he used to watch it go around the Christmas tree every year collecting dust from the rug and pine needles from the tree. The set grew throughout the years, but he lost interest after joining the Navy and seeing the world through a porthole. There just was no room for railroading.

After buying his first home in San Diego, he returned to railroading, this time in HO scale. Reluctantly giving up half his garage, he began a typical 4x8 layout and started putting together a small collection of rolling stock and buildings. During two trips to the Gulf of Tonkin during the Viet-

nam War, he spent his off time building Ambroid and Quality Craft rolling stock, accumulating a nice consist of contemporary freight cars. But the dreams of a layout came to an abrupt end when he received orders for Hawaii. He shipped his 4x8 piece of plywood but it never arrived. That was just as well, because there was no place in Hawaii to build anything. The rolling stock and buildings remained in the moving boxes until he moved to Lexington in 1996.

Retiring from the Navy after 26 years, he and his family settled in El Paso, Texas where he eventually found work with the Customs Service and became a Customs Inspector in 1988. After working on the Southern Border of our Country, he realized that there was another war going on

and decided that he did not want to participate again. This war must be fought by the next generation. So he looked for another job and found Lexington, compliments of some friends in Louisville


Arriving in April, 1996, he heard about the Bluegrass Model Railroad club when it visited Southern Lights and was invited to come to a meeting. He did and that re-started his railroading career.

Currently, he is into building modules in the Bluegrass Model Railroad club layout and still has not given up his garage for a more permanent layout. learned from Orville Boes that "you can never have enough engines" so he is trying to accumulate enough contemporary rolling stock and is into building "stack trains" from the far West, i.e., Southern Pacific, Union Pacific and BNSF, to provide a contrast to the coal trails of the CSX and Norfolk Southern that are predominantly modeled in this area. Skip is into intermodal operations and enjoys the contrast to the local modeling of the Kentucky area.

He enjoys everyone and readily excepts ideas from anyone in the club. A regular member of the Tuesday Night group, he enjoys the company and criticism of everyone.
