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NMRA Achievement **Program Explained!**

What do we all have more of than siding space to put them in? With exception of the grains of ballast on our layouts we probably have more pieces of rolling stock than anything else. Ever wonder if any of those cars can count towards the Achievement Program's Master Builder – Cars certificate? Well if you have eight cars that are super detailed and four of them scratch built you may already qualify.

To earn your Master Builder - Cars certificate you need to build eight rolling stock models. They may be any scale and from any era, must be operable (that is, stay on the track when pulled) and of four different types, such as boxcar, tank car, refrigerator car, etc.

One of the eight must be a passenger car or a car normally found in a passenger train. Each car must be super de-

The sample he sent us recently was a 50 foot Southern box car, and for those of you who do not know George's work, it is extremely well done. One of the advantages of getting cars from George is that he can uniquely number each one. Another feature that George will provide, to make this a true Division 10 club car, is lettering with instructions for the return of the car to Div. 10; Lexington, KY.

I attended two NMRA regional conventions in the last several weeks and they were both well worth the time and cost.

On April 25th, 26th & 27th I attended the NMRA Mid Central Region's 'Springdale Express' 2003 convention. It was a four day event for those who had the time. I arrived the second day, on Friday, and immediately started going to clinics.

Rushing in at 10:30 am I attended Dick Flock's clinic 'Modeling Trucks of the 40s and 50s'. This was a great slide presentation which focused on trucks that could be kitbashed to fit the 40s and 50s.

At 1:00 pm I went to Sam Swanson's clinic on 'Finishing Models'. As always Sam's clinic was overflowing with valuable techniques and tips for the serious modeler. I could not take it all in in one hour. I'll get back to this clinic again.

2:30 pm found me in a clinic on building a Model Railroad using 'Foamboard Construction' given by the daddy of Styrofoam, John Bruchnall of "Eastern Loggers" fame. As in most achievement categories, the final step is to have your models judged, either contest judged or merit judged. Four of the cars must earn at least 87.5 points to qualify. Judging will be based on the model's construction, detail, conformity, finish and lettering, and amount of scratch built parts.

As I have stated before, the purpose of the Achievement Program is to encourage you to broaden you modeling skills. So if you haven't scratch built or superdetailed any rolling stock, why not give it a try? You might find a new dimension of the hobby that you enjoy.

At 4:00 pm I was entertained by Larry Bonhaus, the "Tree Man" with a fascinating clinic entitled 'Weeds to Trees'. Larry demonstrated how common garden flowers and boarders are converted to trees. All in about two minutes (each). Using yarrow, sedum, and other plants along with flocking and spray

By 7:00 pm I was getting a little tired, but not too tired to attend a great clinic by John Wissinger, MMR. His clinic on 'The Mechanics of Layout Planning' was all about how to convert the layout of your dreams into an actual operating railroad with few changes and mistakes. John relies on his many years as a professional designer for methods to design and develop layout plans.

At 8:30 pm I enjoyed a really great slide presentation on 'The C&Os Cheviot Hill'. Mike Brestel has captured the birth, life and death of the Cheviot Hill line through photographs of his and others. His personal knowledge of the history of this railroad is quite amazing!

My last clinic of the day, at 10 pm, was a very useful clinic / discussion led by Frank Koch on the NMRA Achievement Program. I found out that I may be further along than I thought. Is the title of MMR in the future for me?

After a good sleep Friday night I was back at it Saturday morning at 10:30. This clinic has changed the entire way I think about model railroading. Alan McClelland, MMR gave a mind expanding explanation of his future and past V&O railroads and why they work! And on top of all that, after getting a chance to meet Mr. McClelland, I had the good fortune of arranging to purchase two sections of the old V&O railroad. WOW!

At 12:30 pm I went to the clinic by Pete Moffett, MMR on 'Open Loads'. Pete displayed a variety of different loads that included bulk commodities, wood chips, lumber loads, steel coils, compressed scrap, steel slabs, etc. This was a great clinic for getting ideas and learning tips on load construction.

My next clinic was a 2:00 pm and I caught Tony Koester's 'Nickel Plate Road's Clover Leaf District'. Tony explained the design and construction
