Rivets: Ah, the love of a father!


Larry: Well, Larry, there's bein' a father and there's bein' a model railroader. Sometimes a man has to make a choice.


McCormick-Stillman Railroad Park

The city of Scottsdale, Arizona has a railroad themed park. A scale Paradise & Pacific Railroad with a steam train can be ridden around the park. The Scottsdale Live Steamers Club operates miniature locomotives built to various scales.

The Scottsdale Railroad Museum includes a Pullman car that was used by Presidents Herbert Hoover, Franklin D. Roosevelt, Harry S. Truman and Dwight D. Eisenhower before Air Force One.

A bunkhouse, part of the original McCormick Ranch, houses three model railroad clubs. They are the Scottsdale Model Railroad Club (HO gauge), Paradise and Pacific Tinplate Club (O gauge), and the Sun-N-Sand Club (N gauge). The N scale layout is pictured above and below. The N layout is about 3.5 scale miles of Ntrak standard modules.

A new building to house these layouts is now under construction. The Sun-N-Sand Club is currently constructing new modules which will expand their layout considerably in the new building.
